Hoke County Community Profile

- Hoke County is not only the third fastest growing county in the state, but also ranks 81st in the
 nation in population growth. From 2010-2014, Hoke County's population grew by 4%. This
 tremendous growth can be attributed to three primary factors:
- Growth in the Hispanic population, which is now at 12%
- Increase in the military population due to Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC), with a militaryconnected student population of 28%
- New residents relocating to Hoke County from surrounding counties






